* "Surprise" parties are a popular way to celebrate a birthday. It is difficult to keep it a secret!

Emma: The e-mail address for your reply is isaacsparty@mail.com.

Gina: Let me send a reply now. I-S-A-A-C-S-P-A-R-T-Y@mail.com. Is that right?

Emma: Yes, that is right.

Target Words

- invitation (noun): a request asking someone to date (noun): month, day, year (U.S.A.) come to an event
 - e.g. The wedding invitations are very pretty.
- **surprise** (noun): something that is not expected
 - e.g. This party was a great surprise.
- to plan (verb): to organize something e.g. I am planning my friend's party.
- e.g. The date is June 3rd, 2016.
- reply (noun): answer e.g. Send your reply to this e-mail address.





Ordinal Numbers: 1st, 2nd, 3rd

You use ordinal numbers to talk about dates.

June 1 = June 1st / June first June 2 = June 2nd / June second June 3 = June 3rd / June third

Examples:

- the first of June / 1st of June
- June first / June 1st

Singular Demonstratives - This and That

Demonstratives point something out. You use **this** when something is close. You use **that** when something is far. You make the negative form by adding **not** after **to be**.

	This	That
Affirmative	This is my brother Isaac.	That is my brother Jacob.
Negative	This is not the invitation for Isaac's party. This isn't the invitation for Isaac's party.	That is not Jacob's address. That isn't Jacob's address.
